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
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Cross-stitch follows a tiled pattern, making it almost a fore bearer to the digital pixel. Because it's comprised of mostly X-shaped stitches, the overall design usually appears geometric and boxy. Most cross-stitching is done using colored cotton floss on woven fabrics, which essentially have built-in grid systems to guide each stitch. For beginners, different sizes of cotton Aida fabric is recommended due to its obvious holes and relatively open weave, but cross-stitch can be applied to fine linen as well. Cross-stitch also requires colorful embroidery floss, which is most commonly sold in six-strand skeins. Most cross-stitch charts require the crafter to separate two to three strands for use at a time. Compared with needlepoint, which uses many multiple shapes and sizes of stitches, cross-stitch can seem more sophisticated and simple, but it can absolutely be used to create intricate, beautiful designs.




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
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
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
