of meat and bread too much and was relieved to ask his shed to take him back home.



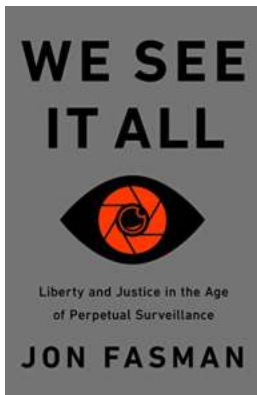

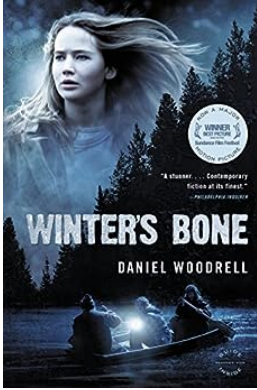

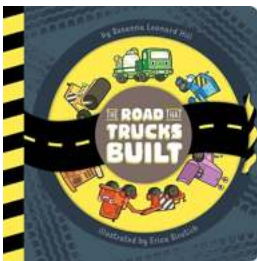
