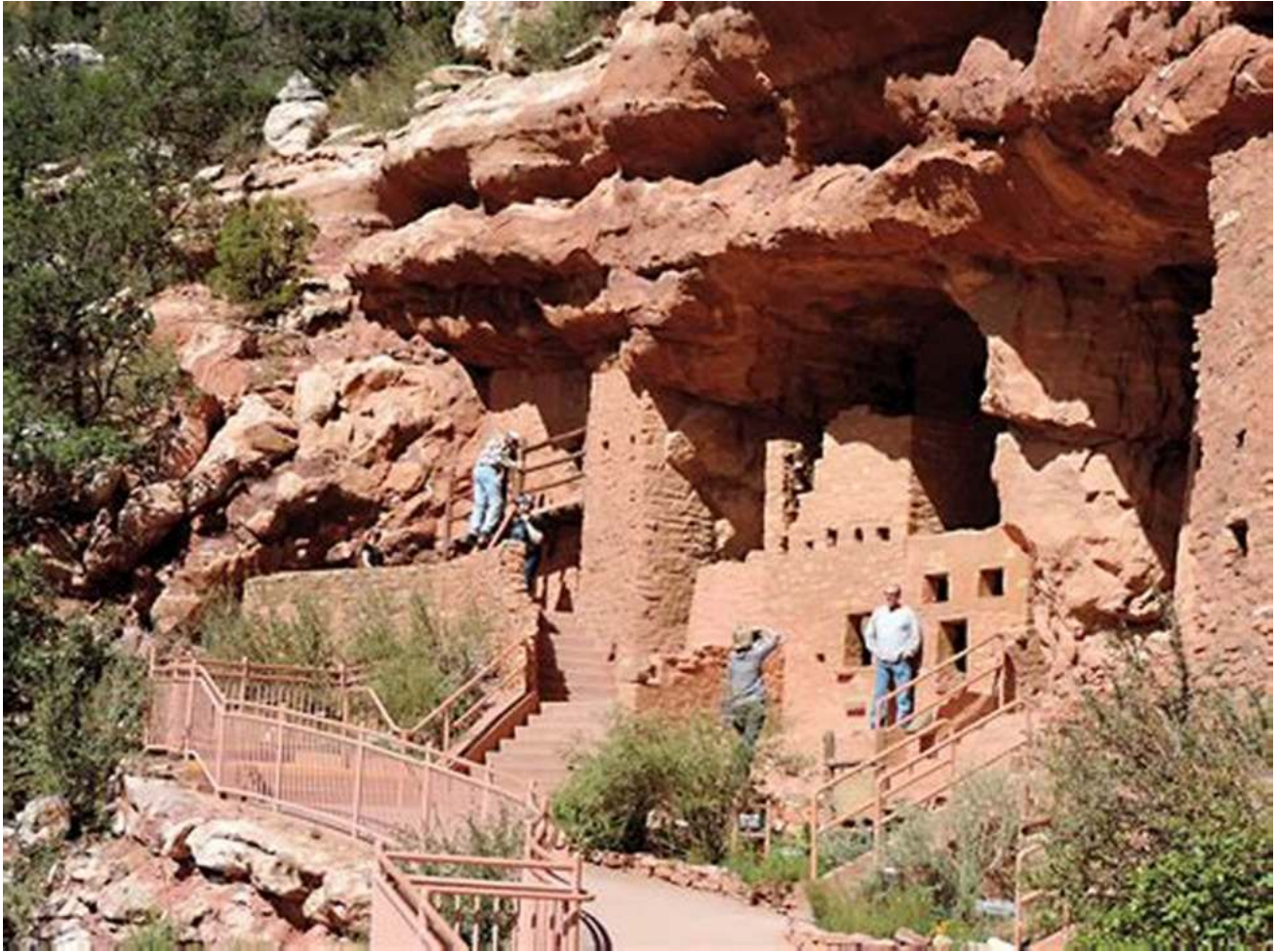

2. Native American Tipis

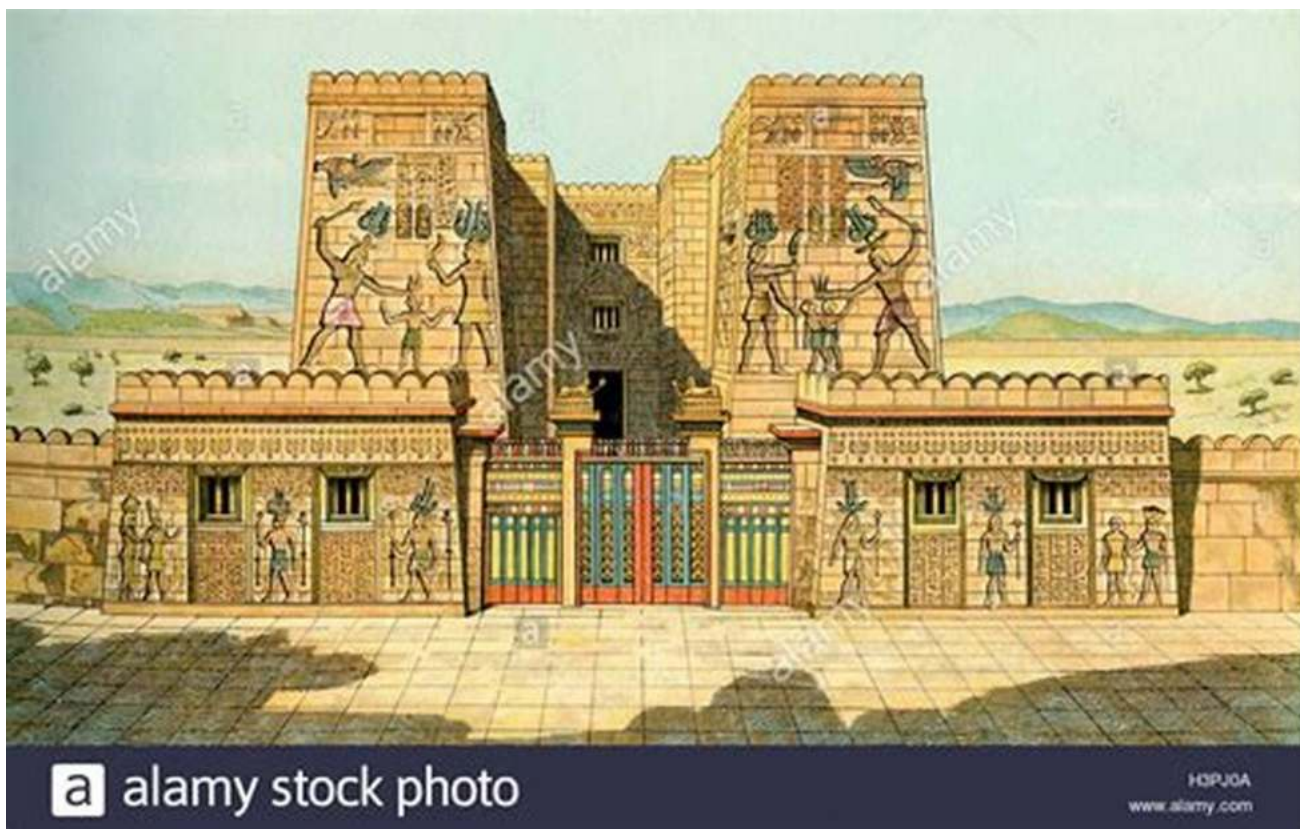

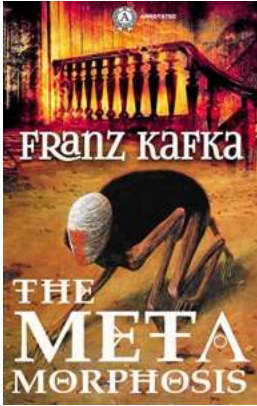

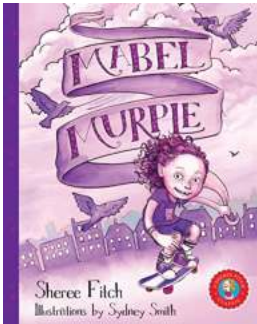
