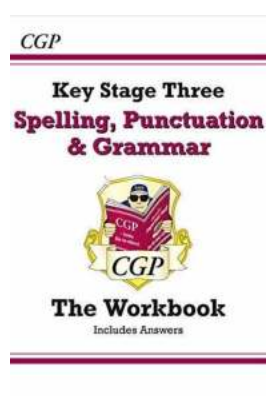

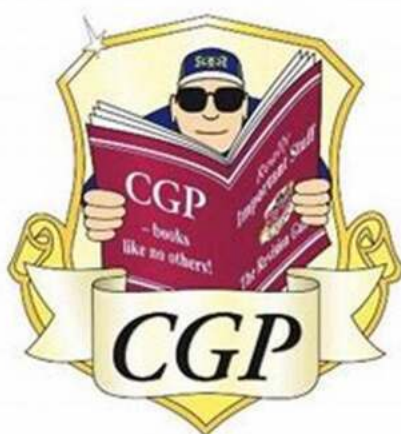

Write a story using 140 characters or less (count letters and punctuation, but not spaces).

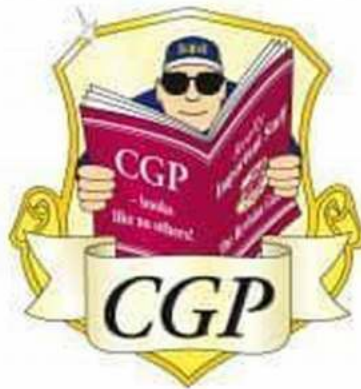
