Da Lat also includes the most weirdest built house in the world known as the Crazy house, and the greatest yet bizarre and beautiful 12000 beer bottle Linh Phuoc pagoda in the country.

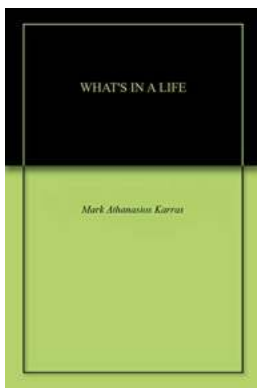

“Little did I know when I left Vietnam at the beginning of February 2020, my plans to return a few months later would be abruptly and indefinitely put on hold.”



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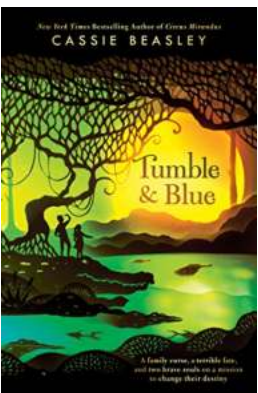
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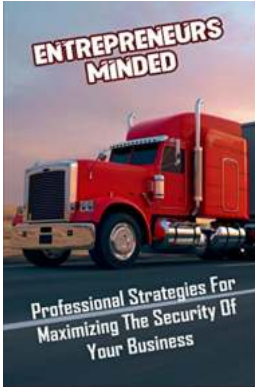
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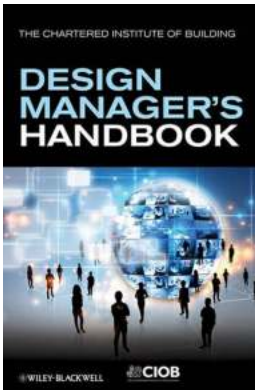
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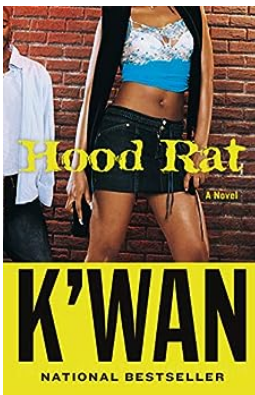
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
