I also found some wonderful circa 1850s lithographs that used some of the same designs. and some others I had never seen before. So then I made patterns from some of those to go with the original patterns. Since I was adding more patterns to the booklet I decided to add some of my favorite cat patterns traced from antique quilt blocks. I do hope you love the results as much as I did.




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
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
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
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
