





The double stitch is the same type of knot as the lark's head knot used in macrame. In shuttle tatting, the right hand is used to maneuver the shuttle around the thread on the left hand. The left hand is used to maneuver the thread that forms the stitches.

The trick to tatting is to perform the movements made by the right and left hands in a continuous motion as you form the loops and tie the knots.


