There are in fact striking overlaps between industrial rhetoric and practice and the development of theatrical and cinematic techniques for rehearsal and performance. *Interchangeable Parts* examines the history of acting pedagogy and performance practice in the United States, and their debts to industrial organization and philosophy. narrates the story of how actors learned to learn to act, and what that process, for both stage and screen, owed to the interchangeable parts and mass production revolutions.



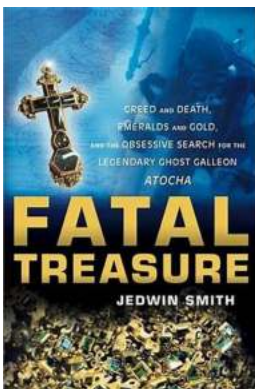
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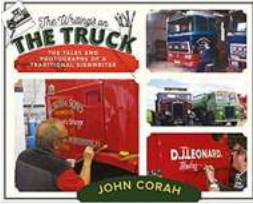
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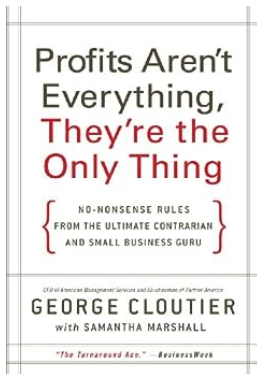
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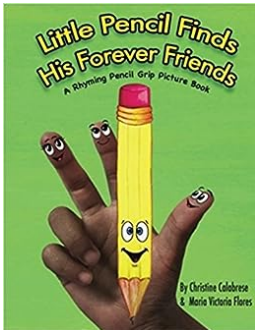
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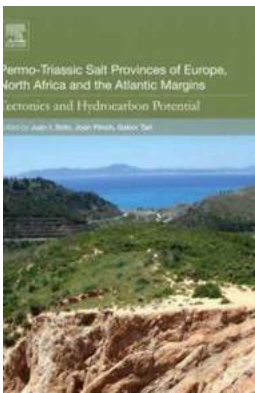
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
