Bangkok had three newspapers at the time, two in English and one in Thai that was published by the government. The author, however, stated that the revenue of the state was undermined by the corruption of the aristocracy and bureaucracy, which meant that taxes and customs duties did not make their way into government coffers.



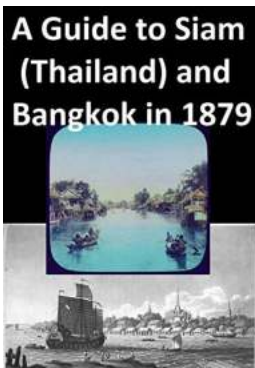
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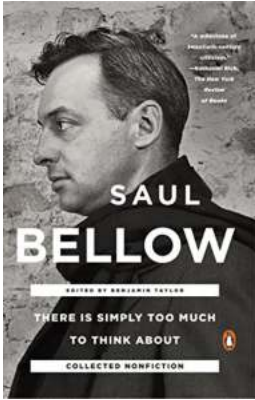
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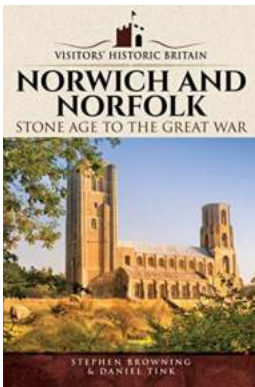
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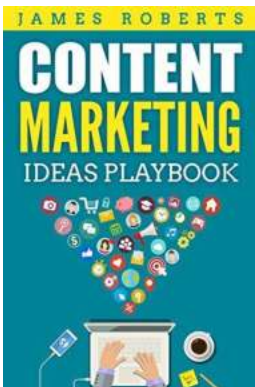
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
