## 1. Running Stitch

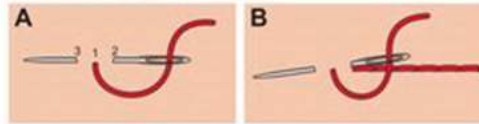

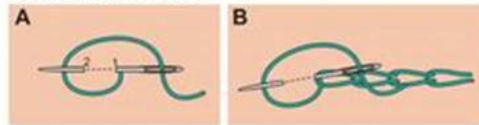
## Basic stitches

### Basic back stitch



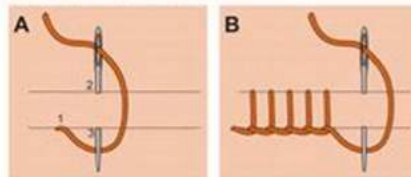
Great for your outline stitch. Work from right to left. Bring needle out at Point 1, insert at Point 2 and come out at Point 3. The main thing with this stitch is to make sure that the distance between 1-3, and 1-2 is exactly the same. Repeat sequence for next stitch.

### Basic chain stitch



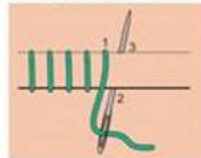
Another great stitch for outlining objects or if worked in close rows for filling an area. Bring needle out at Point 1 and insert back into same hole at Point 1. Bring out at Point 2, carrying thread under needle point and then pull it through. Point 2 now becomes point 1 for your next stitch.

### Basic blanket stitch



Great stitch for using on edges! Bring needle out at Point 1 (bottom line). Insert at Point 2 (on a slight diagonal) then come up at Point 3 directly below from Point 2. Repeat sequence but remember that Point 3 of previous stitch is now Point 1.

### Basic whipstitch



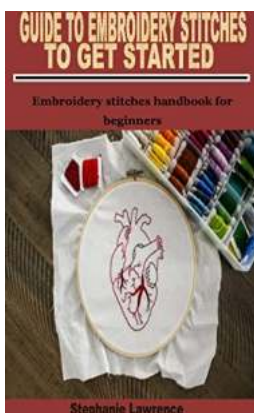
I love this stitch for applique! Bring needle out at Point 1 and insert at Point 2 (right at the edge of your applique piece and in a straight line from point 1). Come out at Point 3 and repeat sequence.

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## 2. Back Stitch

The back stitch is a strong and durable stitch that creates a solid line. It is often used for outlining intricate patterns, creating lettering, or adding finer details to your embroidery. The backstitch can also be used to fill shapes by working rows of closely spaced stitches.



### 3. Satin Stitch

The satin stitch is excellent for filling shapes, creating solid blocks of color, or adding dimension to your designs. It involves closely spaced straight stitches that completely cover the outlined area. The result is a smooth and satin-like finish.



## 4. Chain Stitch

The chain stitch is a decorative stitch that can be used for outlining, creating borders, or filling shapes. This stitch creates a series of loops that resemble a chain. It can be worked in a straight line or in curves, making it versatile for various designs.

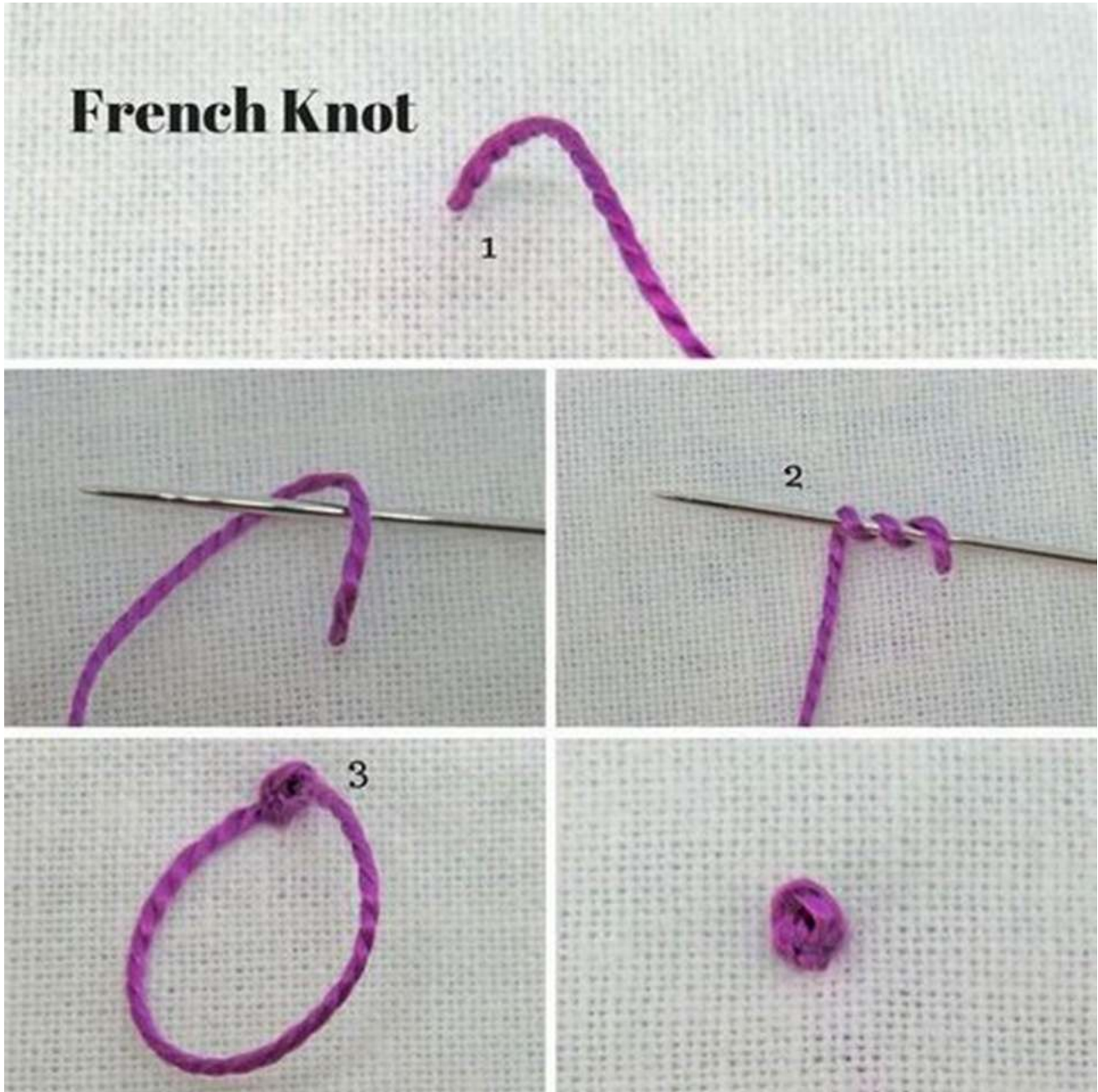




## 5. French Knot

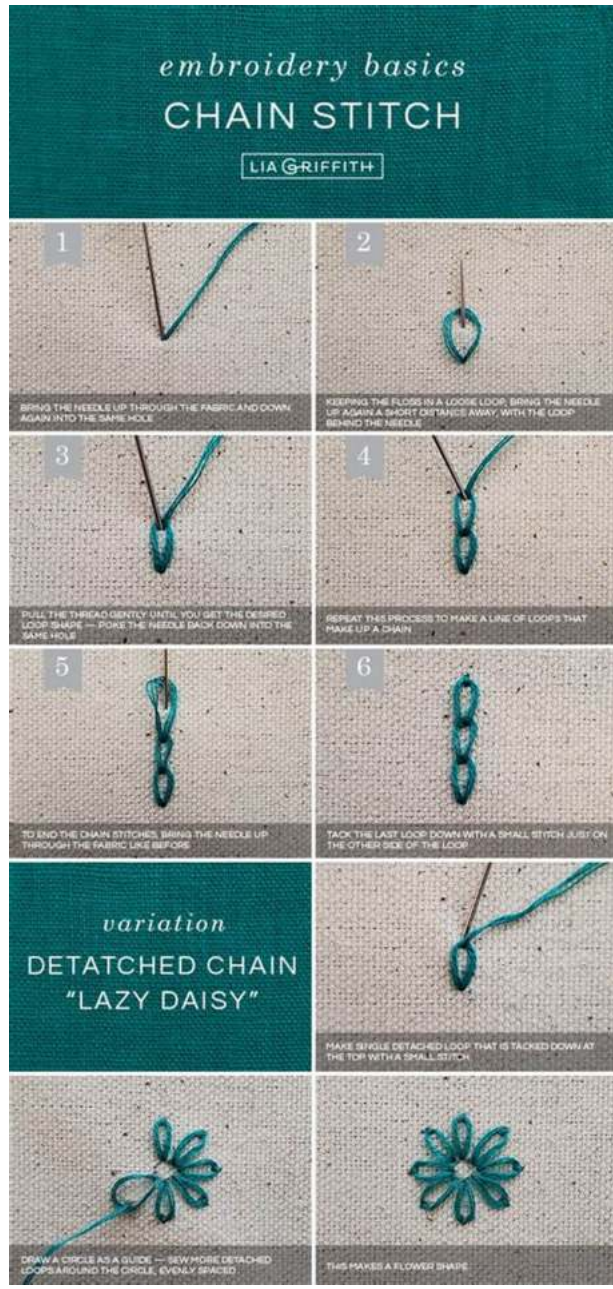
