

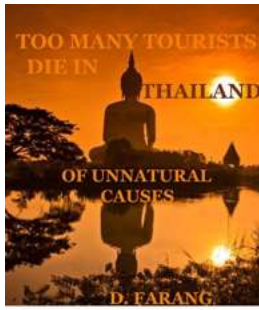

4. Health insurance policy showing a minimum coverage for COVID-19 of not less than 100,000 US Dollar (Required from some types)*

Onboard the aircraft

1. Wear a mask or face covering during the flight.
2. Follow crew advice and public health requirements.

Upon arrival

1. Undergo the COVID-19 screening (checking symptoms and body temperature).
2. Download the tracing mobile phone app.
3. Enter a 14-day local or state quarantine.
