If that is your objective, to be a great project manager, this book is for you.



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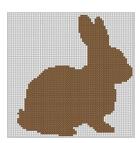
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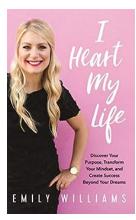
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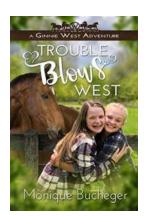
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
