My mother told me that she and her younger sister were taught a particular subject, at school in England after the 2nd world war, called Domestic Science, and these types of courses were even taught at the college level.

I was looking in my aunt's practical books, and found plenty of tie and dye patterns, which had to be made by the students, in order to pass the Degree Course.

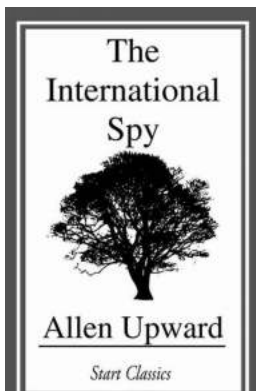

So let us begin with tips on how to dye properly.



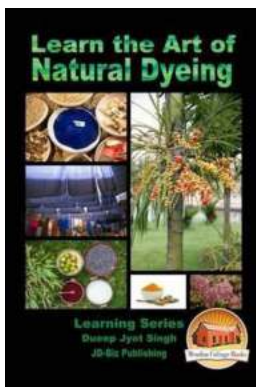
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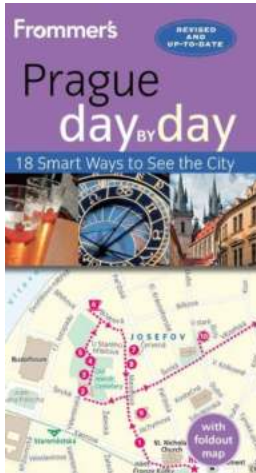
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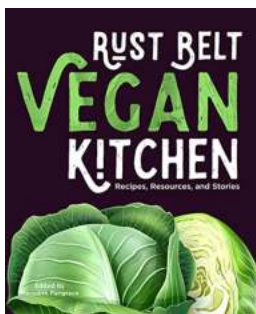
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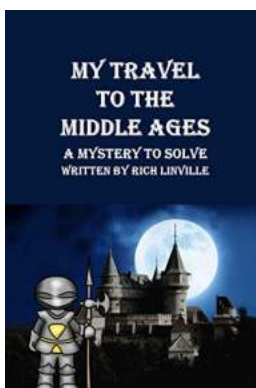
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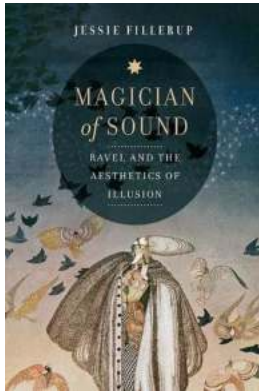
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
